2 Minutes of Previous Meeting

The minutes of the meeting of the East Kilbride Area Committee held on 28 March 2023 were submitted for approval as a correct record.

3 Scottish Fire and Rescue Service

G Tudhope, Watch Commander, Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS), gave a presentation on the 2022/2023 Annual Performance and Activity Report for the East Kilbride area.

The presentation provided performance information covering the period 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023, with a comparison against the same period from the previous year. Information was provided on:-

- deliberate primary fires
- deliberate secondary fires

- accidental dwelling fires
- accidental 'other' building fires
- fatal fire casualties
- non-fatal fire casualties (excluding precautionary check-up)
- special service (road traffic collisions)
- special service (fatal and non-fatal casualties)
- false alarms (malicious false alarms and unwanted fire alarm signals (non-domestic))

G Tudhope, having responded to members' questions, was thanked for his informative presentation.

The Committee decided: that the presentation be noted.

4 Education Resources – Participatory Budgeting - Pupil Equity Funding

A report dated May 2023 by the Executive Director (Education Resources) was submitted providing a case study on Participatory Budgeting (PB) in relation to Pupil Equity Funding (PEF) within Sanderson High School, East Kilbride.

Following a consultation and voting process, schools had progressed with their spend, to ensure the minimum 5% had been fully spent by the end of March 2023.

Sanderson High School's PB work, outlined in Appendix 1 to the report, was an example of good practice within the East Kilbride area and a particularly good example of PB within the Additional Support Needs sector. The school had made the PB process accessible to all its learners, demonstrating the value and commitment to PB and pupil voice.

As part of the consultation, stakeholders clearly identified that the school's most complex pupils were often excluded from engaging with many wider community learning experiences due to the complexities of their needs, often leading to increased isolation. Therefore, stakeholders had voted for pupils to have access to the Council's Outdoor Resource Base (ORB) to help them overcome those barriers.

The ORB had provided pupils with complex needs, much needed opportunities to engage safely in a bespoke outdoor curriculum beyond the school environment. Further outreach work in the school had built on the skills and experiences gained at the ORB. Six targeted learners had achieved Curriculum for Excellence attainment outcomes at an accelerated rate as a result of the ORB experience.

There had also been an increase in learning engagement levels, a reduction of violent incidents and an increase in skills developed. A further section showing this impact would be added to the case study at the end of the academic year once final evidence had been gathered.

PB was now fully embedded in all South Lanarkshire Council schools through the PEF. Schools continued to allocate a minimum of 5% of their PEF to be the subject of PB year-on-year. Schools had received updated guidance on this at the PEF Head Teacher and Equity Lead Information Session in May 2023. Optional PB training was planned for August for schools who had new PB Leads or needed a refresh.

South Lanarkshire Council schools' PB work continued to be recognised nationally as an example of good practice. Several local authorities had approached the Council for guidance and support in this area, as South Lanarkshire was the only local authority in Scotland who had dedicated as much as 5% of PEF from all schools for PB purposes. A COSLA award application had been submitted to showcase the work of schools in this area.

Education Resources would provide Area Committees with:-

- a summary report of each school's PB outcome
- case studies of school activity, which had particular impact/success
- a detailed financial report of how PEF money allocated for PB had been spent

Education Resources would support schools and monitor and track the impact of this activity. Findings would inform any future PB activity within the Resource.

J Graham, Depute Headteacher and the Lead Officer responded to members' questions.

5 Playscheme Grant Applications 2023/2024

Community Partnership Board Update

1. Purpose of Report

- 1.1. The purpose of the report is to:-
 - provide the Area Committee with background and an update on the progress of the development of the East Kilbride and Strathaven Community Partnership

2. Recommendation(s)

- 2.1. The Committee is asked to approve the following recommendation(s):-
 - (1) that the progress being made in respect of the East Kilbride and Strathaven Community Partnership, be noted

3. Background

- 3.1. The Community Planning Partnership (CPP) Board undertook a self-assessment which was facilitated by the Improvement Service during January/February 2019. Following approval of the Best Value Assurance Report by the Council in June 2019, an extended CPP session took place on 11 September 2019 to consider the output of the facilitated self-assessment session along with the outcomes of the Council's Best Value Assurance Report.
- 3.2. A session with representatives from the CPP Thematic Partnership Boards took place on 3 October 2019 and draft implementation plans were prepared on the CPP structure, joint problem solving and scrutiny of the work of the Thematic Boards.
- 3.3. A further session took place with the Board on 23 October 2019 to consider how the CPP Board should be structured at a Thematic/Locality level. Proposals drafted by the Improvement Service and the Community Planning Team included the formation of Neighbourhood Partnerships at a locality level. These were approved by the CPP Board in December 2019.
- 3.4. These recommendations brought together community planning areas into 4 collaborative, locality-level, Community Partnership Boards; Rutherglen and Cambuslang, Clydesdale, East Kilbride and Hamilton which is still in development. Boards include representatives from development trusts, community councils, neighbourhood planning action groups and other local community anchor organisations. They are chaired by community leaders who have a place on the CPP Board.
- 3.5. These Partnerships provide a link for the CPP to take forward the Community Plan and Neighbourhood Plans alongside its community partners.

4. Current Progress

- 4.1. The third meeting of the Community Partnership Board was held in June 2023. Further development work is required to increase the current membership. Over the last few months, the team attended meetings of local groups to encourage participation. The intention would be for representatives from this newly formed network to be invited to the development sessions of the established Community Partnership.
- 4.2. At the meeting of the 22 March 2023, the CPP Board agreed to continue with the allocation of Lived Experience Funding to the Community Partnerships. £2,000 has been allocated to East Kilbride and Strathaven Community Partnership which will be supported to use this funding within its local area to gather the experiences of local people to inform a better understanding of inequalities.
- 4.3. East Kilbride and Strathaven Community Partnership continues to receive a monthly register of local and national information that is of interest relating to policy development and delivery. Local information is provided by some partners and is also acquired from a range of national sources.
- 4.4. The CPP Development Officer is currently undertaking a mapping exercise to review how representative each of the current groups are of their local area. Where gaps have been identified, the Officer has been attending meetings with Community Councils and Neighbourhood Planning Groups to promote the CPP and provide an update on partner activity.
- 4.5. Further mapping of the East Kilbride locality is to take place which will include faceto-face and online communication of CPP objectives and activities.
- 4.6. A Community-Led Plan was developed in <u>Sandford and Upper Avondale</u> and there was also a Neighbourhood Plan in 2020/2021 developed by the Westwood Community. This provides the opportunity for wider resources to support actions over localities with a view to improving outcomes and to work in partnership at a locality level across South Lanarkshire. East Kilbride and Strathaven Community Partnership will be at the forefront of this activity, linking the local community to the CPP.
- 4.7. The CPP Board agreed to develop new neighbourhood planning arrangements in East Kilbride in 2022. Initial development work has begun in the areas of Crosshouse, Greenhills and Whitehills in East Kilbride. Discussions have started with the Child Poverty Working Group about the potential for developing a thematic approach to the Neighbourhood Plan around child poverty.
- 4.8. A community mapping exercise has been completed and the first East Kilbride stakeholders' meeting is to take place at the end of August and there has been a good response from stakeholders. The stakeholder group will include practitioners from the Child Poverty Working Group to support the child poverty element of the plan.

After the stakeholder discussion, the intention is to have the consultation going live in October. The Community Engagement Team will work with stakeholders in the consultation, with support from the Child Poverty Working Group, to engage children, young people and their families through existing work and networks.

5. Next Steps

5.1. The East Kilbride and Strathaven Community Partnership had a meeting on 15 June 2023 and it was agreed to hold a future development session. All stakeholders would be invited to this and the initial plan was for the session to be held in September. The Community Partnership Board would also like to invite representatives from the 2 established Community Partnerships (Clydesdale and Cambuslang and Rutherglen) to the session with a venue still to be agreed.

6. Can Do Community Challenge Fund

- 6.1. The <u>'Can Do Community Fund'</u> is a 1-year investment fund from South Lanarkshire Council for neighbourhoods in the Community Partnership area that do not have Participatory Budgeting funding. This funding aims to address specific needs and targets projects identified through consultation with local communities. Monies are not available in areas where a Neighbourhood Plan is in place.
- 6.2. Community organisations, including Community Councils, have the opportunity to apply for grants up £10,000 to tackle identified issues within their areas, whether they require revenue, capital funding or a combination of both. The fund has a £200,000 limit for the whole of South Lanarkshire and could benefit a minimum of 20 projects.
- 6.3. Area Committees will be requested to make the final decisions on those applications that have met the funding criteria and have evidenced community support.

8.1. Financial resources to support Community Partnership activity are outlined at 4.2. and Council funding available for community groups at 6.2.

 - involve people in the community by bringing them together to enjoy educational, recreational, leisure and other community activities or to improve the local environment
- 3.3. Support can be provided for a range of activities including administration and publicity costs, purchase of equipment and materials, annual outings and entrance fees, start-up costs and special events.
