2 Minutes of Previous Meeting

The minutes of the meeting of the Cambuslang and Rutherglen Area Committee held on 6 November 2018 were submitted for approval as a correct record.

The Committee decided: that the minutes be approved as a correct record.

3 Routes to Work South

S Barr, Chief Executive, gave a presentation on Routes to Work South (RTWS), a singlemember charitable organisation whose principal aim was to help local people to gain sustainable employment. The presentation highlighted that:-

- RTWS operated exclusively to support South Lanarkshire residents and businesses by working with local people and employers to link opportunity and need
- through its extensive community outreach, RTWS targeted under represented communities and deprived areas
- there were 4 central employability hubs, one in each of South Lanarkshire's 4 localities which were situated close to complementary provision such as Jobcentre Plus, Citizens' Advice Bureau and Q&A facilities (all of the hubs provided free broadband, 1-2-1 meeting rooms, training space and computer access
- the company recognised the benefits of joint working and partnership with others and had a policy of co-locating with partners, which included Business Gateway and Skills Development Scotland, and operated in partnership with the Council and an extensive range of local service providers

RTWS offered a wide range of employability and training services for adults and young people

S Barr, having responded to members' questions, was thanked for his informative presentation.

South Lanarkshire Carers' Network

I Murray, Business Network Manager and P McIntosh, Partnership and Engagement Officer, gave a presentation on the South Lanarkshire Carers' Network, an information gateway for unpaid carers in South Lanarkshire. The presentation provided details of the:-

- definition of a carer
- context of caring with an estimated 38,000 carers in South Lanarkshire ٠
- Carers (Scotland) Act 2016 which placed a range of duties on public bodies and extended the rights and potential entitlements of adult and young carers
- purpose of the Carers' Network which was to support unpaid carers across South Lanarkshire by:
 - providing information to carers
 - hosting and co-ordinating the only carers' network across South Lanarkshire
 - providing an empowering service
 - influencing local services
 - getting involved in local decision-making
 - campaigning on behalf of carers
- overall aims of the Carers' Network and what it did to support carers

I Murray and P McIntosh, having responded to members' questions, were thanked for their informative presentation.

Education Scotland Report – Cairns Primary School and Nursery Class

1. Purpose of Report

- 1.1. The purpose of the report is to:-
 - advise of the outcome of the inspection of Cairns Primary School and Nursery Class by Education Scotland inspectors.

2. Recommendation(s)

- 2.1. The Committee is asked to approve the following recommendation(s):-
 - (1) that the Education Scotland Report on Cairns Primary School and Nursery Class be noted.

3. Background

- 3.1. Cairns Primary School and Nursery Class were inspected in December 2018 as part of a national sample of primary and nursery education.
- 3.2. As part of the revised approach to inspection, the Education Scotland inspectors evaluated the leadership of change; learning, teaching and assessment; raising attainment and achievement and ensuring wellbeing, equality and inclusion.
- 3.3. The inspection team analysed questionnaires issued to a sample of parents, pupils and to all staff. Inspectors observed class lessons and interviewed groups of pupils, including the pupil council, and staff. Members of the inspection team also met parents and members of the local community.
- 3.4. The report by Education Scotland was published on 26 February 2019.

4. Findings of Education Scotland Inspectors

- 4.1. Education Scotland made comment under the following headings:-
 - quality of leadership and management,
 - learning provision and
 - children's successes and achievements.
- 4.2. Education Scotland found there is a range of very good practice across the school in terms of learning, teaching and assessment and on the wellbeing and inclusion of children, which is leading to good levels of attainment across literacy, numeracy and health and wellbeing.

- 4.3. Inspectors recognised that the promotion of wellbeing for children and their families in the nursery strongly underpins the school community values, resulting in relaxed, happy children who are making good progress in their learning.
- 4.4. Education Scotland found that children and young people in Cairns are treated as unique individuals with their own skills, talents and needs and that staff's responsiveness to each child's needs is a major strength.
- 4.5. Inspectors recognised the leadership of change as a major strength in the school and nursery class. The headteacher, senior management team and staff work very effectively with children, parents and community members to develop a clear vision for the school and nursery which in turn fosters ambition and aspiration in what children are expected to achieve.
- 4.6. Particular strengths of the school were identified as follows:-
 - Children who are responsible, respectful, happy and hardworking. The high expectations children have of themselves and others.
 - The nurturing and caring environment promoted by all practitioners and staff. Their strong focus on high standards and aspiration.
 - The effective leadership of the headteacher and senior leadership team in promoting a motivational whole-school ethos for learning.
 - The teamwork of staff and their commitment to continuous professional learning linked to successful improvement across the school and nursery class.
 - Successful partnerships with parents, agencies and other organisations, which impact positively on children's learning.
- 4.5. Education Scotland identified the following area for continued improvement:-
 - Continue to develop a clear overview of children's progress to further improve children's attainment and achievement.
- 4.6. This area for improvement has been incorporated into the school's improvement plan. Progress on the identified area for improvement will be shared with parents.
- 4.7. Education Scotland have intimated that they are confident that the school will be able to take forward the area for improvement and will make no more visits in connection with this report. The local authority will inform parents about the school's progress as part of the authority's arrangements for reporting to parents on the quality of its schools.

Dear Parent/Carer

In December 2018, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland visited Cairns Primary School, Additional Support for Learning Department and Nursery Class. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the establishment's work.

- Children who are responsible, respectful, happy and hardworking. The high expectations children have of themselves and others.
- The nurturing and caring environment promoted by all practitioners and staff. Their strong focus on high standards and aspiration.
- The effective leadership of the headteacher and senior leadership team in promoting a motivational whole-school ethos for learning.
- The teamwork of staff and their commitment to continuous professional learning linked to successful improvement across the school and nursery class.
- Successful partnerships with parents, agencies and other organisations, which impact positively on children's learning.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from South Lanarkshire Council.

• Continue to develop a clear overview of children's progress to further improve children's attainment and achievement.



We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using four quality indicators from How good is our school? (4th edition) and How good is our early learning and childcare?. Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
